

FORM 8843

What is Form 8843?

Form 8843 is <u>not</u> an income tax return. Form 8843 is merely an informational statement required by the U.S. government for certain nonresident aliens (including the spouses or dependents of nonresident aliens).

Who Needs to File Form 8843?

<u>All</u> F-1/J-1 visitors and their F-2/J-2 dependents must file Form 8843 if they are considered 'non-residents for tax purposes.' This is the case whether or not you earned income or will need to file a tax return, too. Form 8843 must be filed if both of the following conditions are met:

- 1. Present in the U.S. in F-1, F-2, J-1, or J-2 status for any portion of the previous calendar year (the year for which you are filing)
- 2. A non-resident for tax purposes

NOTE: If you changed status during the previous calendar year from a 'non-resident for tax purposes' to a 'resident for tax purposes', or vice versa, you may be considered a 'Dual Status Alien'. If you think you may be a Dual Status Alien, you should visit the <u>IRS website</u> for more information.


If you had earned income or a taxable scholarship in the U.S., you may <u>ALSO</u> need to submit form 1040NR or 1040NR-EZ ("tax returns"). For more information about submitting a tax return with Form 8843, refer to the International Web Canvas Course.

For those who <u>DO</u> submit a tax return form (1040NR or 1040NR-EZ), the address section does not need to be completed.

- Give the visa type <u>printed on the visa</u> in your passport that you used to enter the United States.
- Give the date you entered the U.S. most recently.

Enter your current visa designation. If your visa status has changed since you last entered the United States, enter the date your status changed.

- 1a Type of U.S. visa (for example, F, J, M, Q, etc.) and date you entered the United States >

How do I submit form 8843?

Double check that you have completed all required fields. Make a copy or scan for your records. You must mail each individual 8843 to the address below. Even if you have dependents, everyone must submit their own 8843 in a separate envelope.

Due Date: If you **did** <u>not</u> receive any taxable income in 2019, the filing deadline is June 15, 2019 (filing form 8843 only).

Due Date: If you **did** receive taxable income in 2019, submit a Form 1040NR or 1040NR-EZ (tax returns), include the Form 8843 in the envelope, and file no later than April 15, 2020. **For more information about submitting a tax return with Form 8843, refer to the International Web Canvas Course.**
